

Flowering Crab Apple Tree

This is truly a tree for all seasons. In the early spring tremendous quantities of bright, wine-red blossoms are followed by fruits that cling to the branches until winter. These fruits are a great attraction to the birds. The average height 20-25 feet.



Magnolia Soulangeana Tree

Known generally as the Japanese magnolia, these very large fragrant blooms appear before the leaves, usually blooming before anything else in the Spring. Specimens of this plant grow to a mature height of 15 feet with bright green, large, coarse leaves.



Green Ash Tree

A large moderately fast-growing tree with a rounded crown and dark, glossy green foliage. Green Ash is a good specimen for semi-arid areas and high altitudes. Its fall foliage is a bright yellow and average mature height is approximately 60 feet.



Sugar Maple Tree

The sap of this tree is used to make maple syrup, the tree being one of the longest lived shade trees. The bright green leaves in the autumn change to vivid scarlet and gold. At maturity they grow to 60 feet.



Norway Maple Tree

A good large shade tree where other maples won't grow. It has a rounded, symmetrical, dense crown and grows 40 to 50 feet tall and wide. Green leaves turn yellow in fall in the North; It tolerates heat, drought, poor soil, and pollution.



Zelkova

Has a smooth-barked, straight trunk. The dark-green foliage turns a rusty red in fall. A tree to 50 feet, a little broader than other Zelkova. Native of Japan and Korea was introduced in 1862 and is highly resistant to Dutch Elm disease. The mature bark is often exfoliating with character much like Chinese Elm-Ulmus parvifolia.



Silver Maple Tree

Growing to a height and width of 80 feet, The leaf is bright green above and white beneath. Growth is rapid in both pure and mixed stands and the tree may live 130 years or more.



Weeping Japanese Cherry

This extremely early-flowering Cherry becomes a glorious cascading bank of flowers at the very first hint of spring. Its full weeping habit, reaching 10 to 15 feet high and wide, sports profuse, fully-double, rosy-pink flowers that mature to white against fine-textured foliage. Our plants are top-grafted, transplant easily and grow rapidly in full sun to moderate shade (in the south). Prune to develop good form.



Serviceberry Tree

This large shrub has erect stems that form multi-stemmed clumps. The serviceberries, genus *Amelanchier*, are deciduous shrubs or small trees that grow in the understory of temperate forests. This deciduous tree/shrub is multistemmed and gets up to 20 ft tall with a dense, bushy spread up to 10 ft across. Serviceberry trees have leaves that are 2 inches long and have a very pretty white fuzzy coat when young, but becoming shiny green as they mature. The fall color is brilliant yellow, red or orange. The flowers are white and borne in erect clusters in early spring as the leaves are unfolding. The berrylike fruits are showy and edible. The little serviceberry shrubs are useful in naturalized plantings, especially in open woodlands, under tall oaks or pines. Their beautiful, but brief, early spring flowering beats all but the earliest shrubs, and their fall foliage is first rate. It is an excellent small yard tree.
